



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STADTSILHOUETTE

The city scene as a collective creation


It took forty Italian stonemasons to create the stone sculpture "Stadtsilhouette", a design by the architects Max Dudler and Simone Boldrin, which was conceived as a collaborative project. In 2016, the sculpture made with $22m^3$ of natural stone in total, has been showcased at the stone trade fair Marmomacc in Verona. Later it found its permanent location inside the "Baden Powell"-park in San Severo, returning back to the region where the stone originally came from. The artwork represents the silhouette of a city as a multilayered scene and utilises the same vocabulary as Max Dudler's architecture.

The sculpture consists of milled and interlocked blocks of Pietra di Apricena (fiorito-K66) stone and has the imposing total mass of $4.50~\rm m \times 4.50~\rm m \times 4.50~\rm m$. A stone world that is completely defined by architecture. Seen from the side, the sculpture appears almost flat or two-dimensional. Yet with a shift in perspective the stone cityscape fans out into a complex multilayered ensemble. A sense of density and depth, conjuring the multidimensional character of an urban landscape. The city as a stage set. Here, the city is scenery and stage at the same time. The language of this stone entity is the same one that informs all Max Dudler's buildings: A house never stands alone, but is an integral part of a sculptural


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
cityscape, created out of collective processes. This is illustrated by one of his most successful buildings, the Jacob-und-Wilhelm-Grimm-Centre, whose outline integrates into the Berlin cityscape while contributing to the portrait of the city and its identity. A somewhat different example is that of the high-rise ensemble on Hagenholzstrasse in Zürich-Oerlikon. Here Max Dudler has created a comprehensive cityscape – a place of urban density with multidimensional character on the suburbs. The city is not the work of any one individual: it is developed out of the collective work of countless people. In the same way, this sculpture is to be seen as a collective work. The natural stone blocks originated from a stone guarry in Apulia, from where three blocks were delivered to 40 Italian stonemasons – each stonemason in a different city, spread throughout all Italy, from North to South from Fast to West. All 40 stonemasons worked the raw stone blocks with the same milling machine and the same software. All the stone blocks from all over the country were in the end reunited and assembled to form the sculpture. In this way, the sculpture is an embodiment of a collaborative building, a collective work of art, just like the city itself. A manifesto of Architecture in a peripheral area of the city.

In 2017, Max Dudler was honoured with the Premio Speciale del Paesaggio "Mosaico di San Severo" for his stonesculpture "Stadtsilhouette". The architect was rewarded for his work on the deeper understanding of (urban) landscapes and his new insights on the "intelligence of place".


















MAX DUDLER

Max Dudler was born in Altenrhein in Switzerland. After completing his studies in architecture at the Städelschule in Frankfurt am Main and at the Hochschule der Künste Berlin, he began his career in the offices of Oswald Mathias Ungers before establishing an architectural office together with Karl Dudler and Pete Welbergen in 1986. He has headed his own practice, with branches in Berlin, Zürich and Frankfurt am Main, since 1992.

Over the past two decades, the practice's focus has expanded beyond traditional architectural tasks. In ever changing contexts, Max Dudler has transposed his conceptual approach onto areas as diverse as urban planning, transportation structures, conversions, historic preservation, exhibition design and even furniture design. He has won numerous awards, including the 2012 DAM Prize for Architecture in Germany for his design for Hambacher Schloss, and the Nike in 2010 for the best urban planning interpretation for the Jacob-und-Wilhelm-Grimm-Zentrum, are the results of the resonance of his continued and active engagement with architecture.

2004 Max Dudler was appointed professor of Baukunst at the Kunstakademie Düsseldorf.
